What do three Past Presidents have in common? Their passion for women's issues and dedication to the mission of Women Lawyers of Sacramento (WLS). WLS recently had the pleasure of hearing from three of our Past Presidents – Jerilyn Paik (1986), Dawn Cole (1991), and Joan Stone (1996) – at the October Luncheon on October 27, 2011. Each Past President shared anecdotes about her experiences as a woman lawyer, as well as issues that were important to women lawyers during their respective leadership periods. A common theme discussed at the Luncheon was the important role that WLS played in each President's life. Ms. Paik, Ms. Cole and Ms. Stone each noted that WLS was more than a bar organization in her mind; it was a group of her closest friends and supporters.

Chief Justice Rose Bird from the California Supreme Court in 1986. Ms. Paik also described the struggles WLS encountered from local clubs and organizations that discriminated against women in membership.

Next, we heard from Past President Dawn Cole. Ms. Cole was President of WLS in 1991. Ms. Cole is currently retired, but previously worked at McDonough Holland & Allen for 28 years specializing in Estate Planning, Trust and Probate law, and Taxation law. Ms. Cole noted

The first Past President to speak was Jerilyn Paik. Ms. Paik was President of WLS in 1986 and currently serves on the 2011 WLS Board as the Past President Liaison. Ms. Paik has spent the past 17 years as a solo practitioner, specializing in Estate Planning, Probate and Trust law, Mediation and Dispute/Litigation matters. Ms. Paik had the opportunity to serve as WLS President during a formative time for women's rights. One of the major issues addressed during her tenure was the removal of

that when she was President of WLS, gender bias within the profession was a significant problem. Even though women were entering the legal profession in greater numbers than ever before, a State Bar survey at that time found that 88% of women lawyers perceived subtle, pervasive gender bias.

Women expressed a lot of frustration about the glass ceiling that kept women from moving upward or the glass wall that kept women from moving into a particular area of law. Another priority for Ms. Cole's Presidency was to help women achieve a work-life balance.

Indeed, Working Woman magazine listed "attorney careers for women 20 years ago.

PRESIDENT'S CORNER

My Transition From Private to Public Law

I started my career in private civil litigation. Although the thought of moving to the State was always in the back of my mind, for nine years I truly did not think I would do anything but practice in the private sector. My goal was to make partner at a large firm. I worked hard, balancing work and life like no other. I didn't sleep very much, but I billed my hours, volunteered in my kids' classrooms, and rarely missed a t-ball or soccer game. I was happily moving forward without looking back. I truly enjoyed working in the private sector and serving the clients that I represented. But in December 2009, when I worked at McDonough Holland & Allen PC, I took some time to reflect on my life after the rumors of the demise seemed to have more truth. I decided (with the help of my wonderful and supportive husband) that I did not want to start over at another private firm. I had given McDonough my all and didn't have the desire to do it all over again. Giving up the thought of making partner was a very difficult decision because I enjoyed what I was doing. But, I decided it was time to move to the State.

I put my application in with the Department of Education. The more I thought about the opportunity to work for the Department of Education, the more excited I got about the move. I was excited about the area of law and felt that with my love for kids and education that it would be the perfect fit. Thankfully, after I interviewed with the Department, my colleagues agreed that it would be a great fit and I officially started at the Department of Education on April 1, 2010. I was nervous about the change. I didn't know how I would handle the move. But I do know that I am generally an optimistic person and make the best of any situation upon which I am faced. The private sector is all I had experienced and I wasn't sure how I would adjust to the change. After only a month, I knew the adjustment would be much easier than I anticipated and there were truly only a few things I missed about the private sector, namely "the perks" (parking, paying for extracurricular events, etc.). But for me, the benefits of the State grew in number and I have not regretted the decision. I have met incredible people who all have a great work ethic and work hard to represent the Department in the best possible manner. I also realized that there were plenty of growth opportunities at the State. My balance of work-life activities definitely favors life now, but I still feel like I am positively contributing as a lawyer. I am able to spend substantially more of my time with my kids. Ultimately, I am more relaxed and am much closer with my husband and kids than I was two years ago. But, I admit that I am biased because if it weren't for my move to the state, I would not be blessed with my beautiful "little tiger."



A Peek Behind the Unity Bar Dinner

Did you ever wonder what it takes to put on an event for over 300 people? I asked WLS President-elect, **Megan Lewis**, this question since Women Lawyers of Sacramento (WLS) was the “Affiliate Chair” for the Unity Bar Dinner that was held at the Doubletree Hotel on October 20, 2011.

Megan epitomized her charge, but it did not reflect the huge amount of time and effort that she devoted to this cause. Megan was quick to also give credit to WLS members **Kara Umeda** (ABAS), for taking on several tasks, and to **Angela Lai**, for securing the Chief Justice of California early on as the keynote speaker.

For the uninitiated, the Unity Bar Association of Sacramento was formed about 25 years ago by Presidents of the minority affiliates of the SCBA (Sacramento County Bar Association), namely, Jerry L. Chong, Asian/Pacific Bar Association of Sacramento (ABAS); Luis Cespedes, La Raza Lawyers Association of Sacramento; and Renard Shepard, of the Wiley Manuel Bar Association. The coalition was to celebrate diversity and unite the minority bar associations. The Unity Bar Association has since expanded and is currently composed of seven affiliates, including WLS, SacLegal, SABA and the newly formed Leonard Friedman Bar Association. At the annual dinner, each affiliate presents awards to deserving citizens for their outstanding service to the community. Scholarships are also announced for law students.

The affiliates take turns in chairing the event, and this year that responsibility fell to WLS. We, unlike others, have assigned this position to the organization’s vice-president, so **Megan Lewis** had the daunting challenge to chair the event. Luckily for Megan, a Dinner Planning Committee assists in the work. The Committee consists of a representative from each affiliate and several from the Unity Bar Association.

“I had the most wonderful experience of meeting with other bar affiliate representatives and making decisions by consensus. I was fortunate to have expertise and support, especially of Patty [Patricia Tsubokawa Reeves] and Amilia [Glikman]. They were my mentors.” These comments by

Unity Bar Attendees & Award Recipients

Tribute to the Honorable Vance Raye, Presiding Chief Justice of the California Court of Appeal for the Third Appellate District

On November 3, 2011, nearly 500 people gathered at the Radisson Hotel to pay tribute to the **Hon. Vance Raye**, Presiding Justice of the California Court of Appeal for the Third Appellate District, and the first African-American presiding justice of California's six appellate districts. Hosted by the Sacramento County Bar Association (SCBA), attendees included members of Sacramento's legal community, the bench of the Third District Court of Appeal, former members of the Third District Court of Appeal (including current Chief Justice of the California Supreme Court, Hon. Tani Cantil-Sakauye), members of local civic organizations, and students who benefit from one of several community organizations in which Justice Raye is an active contributor.

The evening kicked off with the United States Air Force Color Guard posting the colors and the audience reciting the Pledge of Allegiance, a fitting beginning for a tribute to a man whose legal career began 35 years ago as an Assistant Judge Advocate General in the United States Air Force. Retired Justice Rodney Davis, a former colleague of Justice Raye's and now an ordained minister, delivered the invocation. The Master of Ceremonies for the evening was the honoree's predecessor, retired Presiding Justice of the Third Appellate District, Hon. Arthur Scotland, who grabbed everyone's attention by blowing his whistle.

Justice Raye's long-time friend, Mel Woods, current Manager of Government Relations with Eli Lilly, Inc., delivered the first presentation, sharing how a chance meeting in an elevator decades ago evolved into a lifelong friendship. Hon. Kathleen Butz, a current colleague of the honoree, listed a litany of attributes that Justice Raye possesses, from his honesty and integrity to his sense of humor and intellect. Allen Zaremborg, the CEO of the State Chamber of Commerce, discussed not only Justice Raye's incredible sense of humanity, but his proficient juggling skills. And Chief Justice Hon. Tani Cantil-Sakauye spoke fondly of her longtime friend and colleague, noting that he had mentored her in the 1980's as a deputy legislative secretary under Governor Deukmejian before she joined him again at the Third District Court of Appeal. Through the words of many friends and admirers, a portrait emerged of a man who has devoted his life to service. Every speaker commented upon Justice Raye's honesty and integrity, both as a judge and as a person, as well as his sense of humor. One person described him as the kind of person who becomes a "friend for life." Indeed, a kindergarten classmate of Justice Raye's was in attendance!



Justice Raye's membership and chairing of various organizations, teaching at Lincoln Law School, and involvement in promoting literacy have had a far-reaching impact on Sacramento. More than one speaker became emotional when speaking of the support and devotion that Justice Raye has shown to the community, and in particular, the profound effect he has had on the local African-American community. Daniel Bryant, the current president of 100 Black Men of Sacramento, the local chapter of a national organization devoted to improving the quality of life and enhancing the educational opportunities for

African-Americans, presented a formal proclamation in which he honored "Drum Master Vance Raye" for his significant contributions, which include his efforts to promote literacy through the "Real Men Read" project. Tomaysa Glover, president of Sacramento Links, one of the oldest and largest volunteer service organizations of women committed to enriching and sustaining the cultural and economic survival of African Americans, offered a resolution in which she quietly praised Justice Raye for his support and service. And on behalf of the Wiley W. Manuel Bar Association, president Dianne Dobbs honored Justice Raye for his contributions and service to that bar association, including as a founding member in 1977 when it was known as the Sacramento Association of Black Attorneys.

When we reached the part of the program where, as Justice Raye put it, we were "forced to listen to the honoree ruminate," we saw the private side of this public man. We heard not of his accolades and achievements, but of the struggles he faced growing up in a single-parent household during times of segregation in Muskogee, Oklahoma. And yet "it was a good life," he said, one in which his mother and teachers believed in him, and he met a cute girl in ninth grade who would later become his wife of 43 years. His mother instilled in him a strong work ethic and most importantly a belief that one day he would be eating with "important people at fancy dinners." Though humble and reserved, Justice Raye seemed to genuinely enjoy himself throughout the evening. "Everyone should have a night like this," he quipped before leaving the stage to standing applause.
