In fact, he was the first Sacramentan to become a member of the California State Senate. Mr. Steinberg is both a politician and a lawyer and obtained his law degree from U.C. Davis School of Law. Impressively, Mr. Steinberg has served twenty years in public service. He shared his vision of the ever evolving City of Sacramento with us during our luncheon.

During the luncheon, he impressed upon us that we should all be prepared because we never know where our life is going to lead us and that we should be ready to walk through a door of opportunity even on a moment's notice.

Women Lawyers of Sacramento Hosts 23rd Annual ArtFest

On the evening of September 22, 2016, over 200 local judges, practitioners, and law students gathered at the Verge Center for the Arts for Women Lawyers of Sacramento's 23rd Annual ArtFest. The Development Committee moved the event to a new location this year – the Verge – after several successful years at the California Museum. At the Verge, attendees were able to completely immerse themselves in art, moving through giant sculptures and different rooms filled to the ceiling with art selections by the Verge's art exhibitors. Attendees were also able to purchase art by one (or more!) of ArtFest's seven exhibiting artists. It truly was an "Artfest."

It wouldn't be ArtFest without the immensely popular silent auction, which was better than ever this year. WLS board members stacked the auction deck with wonderful and unique items for bid. The silent auction also featured several pieces of art by ArtFest's exhibiting artists, as well as art by attorneys and other individuals in the community. Funds raised from ArtFest go to the WLS Foundation, a nonprofit 501(c)(3) public benefit corporation that provides financial assistance to qualified law students and local community organizations. ArtFest is the Foundation's only fundraising event, and all net proceeds from the event fund the Foundation's community grants and scholarships.

After some slight persuasion by the Honorable Art Scotland (ret.), ArtFest's ever-popular emcee, attendees halted their silent auction perusing and gathered to offer money donations to the WLS Foundation. WLS President Jennifer Hartman King rounded out the evening by bringing the audience back to the reason for the event – awarding the Jean McEvoy Scholarship and nine community grants funded with money raised from last year's ArtFest.

President's Corner

In the final weeks before the 2016 United States Presidential election, we are in an incredibly important moment in history. No matter where we each stand on the political spectrum in our beliefs, at least one thing seems very clear: It is critical that we all exercise our right to vote.

According to many widely accepted polls, women have an unprecedented amount of influence on the outcome of this election. This month, two maps shared by Five Thirty-Eight's Nate Silver showed the likely general election results if only men voted versus if only women voted. The results were dramatic, with opposite candidates winning in an incredible landslide in each scenario. In response to these calculations, the following hashtag began trending on Twitter: #Repealthe19th. This tweet promotes the position that the Constitutional Amendment that gave women the right to vote in 1920 should be repealed in an effort to influence the outcome of the Presidential election. There are so many extraordinarily disturbing aspects of this year's election, and this is one that is particularly offensive to our mission as an organization.

Women Lawyers of Sacramento is premised on the belief that women deserve equal rights, respect and opportunities in the workplace and in society at large. Many people before us marched, fought, suffered and even died to preserve our democratic society and to expand to all Americans the rights guaranteed by the Constitution. Consistent with WLS's premise and in gratitude to those who fought for the 19th Amendment, it is my hope that on November 8th, no matter how we each cast our vote, we will vote in record numbers to demonstrate how much we value the right to participate in our great democracy.


Thank you to all of you who supported and attended WLS's 2016 ArtFest last month. ArtFest is our annual event to raise money to



With this, he has four areas that make up his vision for the future of Sacramento. First, Sacramento should be branded in terms other than just a government town and that it is destination in and of itself. The Sacramento region has strong roots in California's agriculture and is the farm to fork capitol of the world. Our children and future generations should want to live here and invest in the City of Sacramento.

Second, we must actively address our homeless issues. We cannot accept that we have a homeless population and fail to actively help the homeless. We need to provide (1) assertive outreach to the homeless, (2) services to them, (3) case management services and (4) permanent housing. This includes providing adequate trained social workers to the homeless so that no one is overlooked. This would drastically reduce our homeless population, including children, mentally ill, transition age youth and families, perhaps by one-half or three-fourths.

Third, Mr. Steinberg believes that we should invest in our youth. and provide them with year-round paid internships that will give them relevant experience and an applicable introduction to the work place. Our parks and recreation and preschool should be improved and built up to support children and their social welfare.

Forth, our efforts should be regional and that we should work with neighboring governments collaboratively to instill this vision. For example, the homeless population is not unique or isolated to the City of Sacramento and exists in our neighboring cities and counties. We must work with other regional governments to improve our community as a whole.

Mr. Steinberg is looking forward to his time serving as the Mayor of Sacramento. Women Lawyers of Sacramento sincerely thanks Mayor-Elect Darrell Steinberg for speaking and sharing his vision for

Sacramento with us. It was an honor to host Mr. Steinberg and we wish him the best during his term as the Mayor of Sacramento.

2016 California Conference of Bar Associations' Conference of Delegates

The [Conference of California Bar Associations \(CCBA\)](#) provides a unique forum for California lawyers to work together to deliberate and discuss proposals for new laws and to advance critical amendments to existing laws. This year-long process begins with members of each bar association, with the assistance and guidance of the bar association, drafting resolutions for legislation they would like to see adopted and enacted into law. Once the process of creating, editing, and voting on proposed resolutions within each of the bar associations is completed, representatives from each bar association—known as delegates—come together for an annual conference to vote on all of the resolutions. Those resolutions that receive a majority of delegate votes at the conference are then pursued in the Legislature.

Each year, Women Lawyers of Sacramento (WLS) sends delegates to the CCBA Conference to further WLS' interests by participating in this process and introducing or supporting resolutions in line with its mission.

Delegates Lauren Foust Sorokolit, Louinda V. Lacey, and Roxanne Strohmeier, represented WLS at this year's conference in San Diego on September 30 – October 2, 2016.

While WLS did not introduce any resolutions in 2016, the Legislation and Bar Delegation Committee reviewed all of the proposed resolutions in the months leading up to the conference, and—via WLS' three conference delegates—ensured that WLS' voice was included in the discussion and represented

in the voting process.

Consistent with past years, resolutions were proposed in diverse areas of law, covering a myriad of topics. Two resolutions, 07-03-2016 and 05-05-2016—both of which received a majority vote at the conference—may be of particular interest to WLS members.

Resolution [07-03-2016](#) proposed adding Evidence Code section 1162 and deleting section 782.1 in order to provide that condoms shall not be admissible as evidence of prostitution. It was advanced in response to the legislative enactment of Evidence Code section 782.1 in 2014, which permits a prosecutor in a prostitution case to use the defendant's possession of con-

doms as evidence of prostitution. It is intended to eliminate the disincentive to use condoms that section 782.1 created, and to promote the safety of sex workers.

Resolution [05-05-2016](#) proposed the addition of Health and Safety Code section 118600 which would designate "single water closets" as all gender toilet facilities. It was introduced to address the fact that for places of business or places of public accommodation with only one water closet, current law does not address the needs of transgender and gender-nonconforming individuals, people with disabilities or limited mobility, parents, caretakers, and nursing mothers.

For example, transgender and gender nonconforming individuals are frequently harassed in gender-specific bathrooms; people with disabilities or limited mobility are often forced to navigate public spaces in search of gender specific single-occupancy restrooms; parents and caretakers often have to decide which gender-specific bathroom to use with children or adults in their care who are of a different gender; and, nursing mothers may prefer to use a private space to breastfeed or pump, rather than a multi-stall public place. To these ends, resolution 05-05-2016 is intended to decrease harassment of transgender and gender-non conforming individuals, and to increase access for these groups, as well as people with disabilities or limited mobility, parents, caretakers, and nursing mothers.

Both resolutions passed at the conference and are now in the experienced hands of CCBA lobbyist, Larry Doyle, who will pursue a legislative author to carry them through the Legislature.

Another highlight of this year's conference was an exceptional speaker panel that included WLS member and 2015 WLS CCBA delegate, Sosan Madanat, the Executive Director of the Foundation for Democracy and Justice. While we missed having Ms. Madanat at our delegate table this year, we were certainly proud to see her on the center stage. Ms. Madanat joined Justice Judith McConnell of the 4th Appellate District, and California Supreme Court Chief Justice, Tani G. Cantil-Sakauye, on a panel that addressed the importance of civic education and engagement in California schools, and highlighted some of the critical work the [Foundation for Democracy and Justice](#), and the [Power of Democracy](#) are doing to improve access to civic education in our communities.

Finally, this year's WLS Delegates had the honor of attending the CCBA Chair's Celebration of Excellence, an evening reception and awards ceremony. Among the prestigious awards CCBA gives every year, is the Jim Pfeiffer Philanthropy Award. Each year, the Pfeiffer Award is given to individuals who best exemplify Mr. Pfeiffer's—the founding Executive Director of the Foundation of the State Bar of California—"extraordinary legacy of integrity, giving, service, and professional excellence." This year's ceremony was especially exciting because one of the two Pfeiffer recipients, was past WLS President [Diane E Wasznicky](#).

As a State Bar of California Family Law Specialist, Ms. Wasznicky is one of the "foremost leaders in the area of family law in California." In honoring Ms. Wasznicky's extraordinary career, CCBA noted that, "in this year of the 'woman' nationally and politically, Diane has been at the forefront of women's issues in the practice of law." She has served on the Board of Directors of the Sacramento Women's Network and the California Women Lawyers Association, as the co-founder and former President of the Sacramento Area Feminist Legal Services, and as a President of WLS.

Ms. Wasznicky's inspiring acceptance speech included recognition of WLS' legacy of contributions to CCBA, from her first year as a CCBA Delegate when she and Delegate Barbara Yonemura introduced—and passed—nine resolutions on behalf of WLS, to our committee's participation at this year's conference.

As a WLS board member and woman in the early stages of my career, I am inspired by Ms. Waszicky's exceptional accomplishments and dedication, and am proud to be a part of an organization with such a longstanding and consistent legacy of extraordinary leadership and commitment to improving and expanding women's rights and opportunities. Please join us in congratulating Ms. Wasnicky, recipient of the 2016 Pfeiffer Philanthropy Award, for this incredible achievement.

Overall, this year's conference was a success. WLS was able to once again contribute its perspective and to support the advancement into law of resolutions that align with our mission.

We hope you will join us in advancing the WLS mission at next year's CCBA conference. Historically, resolutions proposed by WLS members have not only passed, but have ultimately changed California law to support women and children in our state, and to improve the status of women in society. For example, in 2015, 20 bills that began as proposed CCBA resolutions were enacted into law. Among them was Assembly Bill No. 1791 ("AB 1791"), which was based on a resolution introduced by WLS Vice-President, Sonia Fernandes. AB 1791 increases penalties for individuals who solicit and/or pay for sex with minors under California's disorderly conduct statute, Penal Code Section 647. The success of AB 1791 continues to inspire me, and illustrates how powerful the CCBA forum can be in facilitating legislative change and working to improve and advance the status of women in society.

The date and location of the next conference has yet

to be announced, but we will continue to provide WLS members with CCBA updates throughout the year.

If you have ideas for a resolution that furthers or supports the mission of WLS, please contact any of the members of our [Legislation & Bar Delegations Committee](#). Because the deadline to submit resolutions to CCBA is in January, we kindly ask that you contact us by the end of the November to ensure we have sufficient time to research, draft, and present potential resolutions to the WLS Board of Directors for approval.


